



How to read the Chord Charts

All chords and scales can be played with either the left hand or the right hand. The fingerings are written below the chord charts with LH for left hand and RH for right hand. They are common fingerings and should be seen as recommendations. You can use other fingerings as well, especially for the blues and pentatonic scales, where you're not restricted to one type of fingering. If you play licks or short groupings derived from these scales, the fingering usually changes as well.



Although notated in one octave, all chords and scales can be moved up and down the keyboard. The scale fingerings apply to playing one octave. If you want to play two or more octaves, you have to change the fingerings to connect the scales. For example:

 C major, one octave
 LH 54321321
 RH 12312345

 C major, two octaves
 LH 543213214321321
 RH 123123412312345


Because the same chords can be depicted with different **chord symbols**, a list of common chord symbols is included at the end of the book. To help you determine the key of a tune a **Circle of Fifth** chart is included as well.

For all chords except diminished or augmented ones you can play simple **bass accompaniments** comprised of the root and the fifth of the chord in the left hand. Combine the notes as you like, in any rhythm that you like. Use the octave of the root as well.


